As you know, the wonderful maintenance group planted out the screen along the east fence today. They have done a wonderful job in the last few months to go from removing all the privet to planting and I really would like to thank them all. Some had only a short period of time available on some days, others spent all morning working hard, and dare I say it, many are not altogether young. They were all really enthusiastic and all input was valuable. Geoff and I are really appreciative of the support from the board to do such a big project.



#### From the Garden Guru

Hi everyone, for winter flowering annuals, pot up primulas if you grew them last year, look for seedlings in your lawn or flower beds, they sow seeds profusely. Pansies, viola and Iceland poppy too. Bulbs - plant anemone, daffodils, freesia, grape hyacinth, jonguil, lachenalia, sparaxis and tritionia. Fertilise camelias now. Citrus - fertilise and spray with white oil if insects, scale, or leaf-miner are present. Use autumn leaves to improve your compost heap, run over dried ones with lawn mower,(don't forget your catcher ha.) Plant alyssum, (another self seeding plant) carnation, cornflower, Canterbury bells, delphinium, hollyhock, lupin, stock and verbena. Trim your hedges, before cooler weather sets in. Deadhead lavender after flowering. Repair any damaged area in your lawn and sow new seed. Order bare-rooted roses for winter planting, but never plant a rose where one used to be; they give off toxins that will kill roses but not other plants. Sow sweetpeas in well worked soil. Store tulips in crisper for 4-6 weeks before planting. Vegies - plant beetroot, broccoli, cabbage, leek, lettuce, onion, parsnip, radish and silver best. What's new - a hardy performer that tolerates both frost and heavy soils is the large pinkflowered Aussie-rambler from Ozbreed. That's all for now see vou soon Wally.
